Student Outcome for grades 2nd-7th

- Students will explore the function of the Mishkan and the Jewish tradition which emphasizes the Mishkan as a sanctuary, a holy place to dwell in.
- The building of the Mishkan is a terumah to God, and what it means to be a holy community.

Grades 2/3/4 Text study:

Page 247 verse 8 "And let them make me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them..."

- The Mishkan was not a dwelling place for God but a place set aside for the people to come and experience the presence of God in this world.
- The Mishkan is the heart of godliness
- The Mishkan is a place when community comes together at its best
- Mishkan is the essence of what terumah embodies and the power of what a community can do together to build a kehilla kedosha. Example: writing a sefer torah together, building a actual synagogue or hebrew school, nursery school.

Discussion and Activity:

- o What is a holy place for us personally?
- o How do we work to create a holy space in our home?
- What is a holy place in our communities? (our synagogue, public school, neighborhood)?

Grades 5/6/7 - Text study:

Page 247 verse 8 "And let them make me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them..."

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- The Mishkan is the heart of godliness
- The Mishkan is a place when community comes together at its best
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Page 486 verse 25.2 "Tell the Israelite people to bring me gifts. You shall accept gifts from me; from every man whose heart moves him you shall raise my contribution."

- Understanding the concepts of Terumah vs. Tzedakah vs. Chesed
- Mishkan as the entity of a common goal the greater good
- The Mishkan evokes pride and inspiration in order to have spiritual development
- The contribution of the Mishkan is for God alone, the greater good, without personal benefit or self interest
- The Mishkan is a symbol for collective action rather than individual action

Discussion and Activity:

- Why was it important to contribute to the Mishkan/your community?
- Why was the value that was being conveyed to the entire community when giving to the Mishkan?
- What do we learn from the giving of the Mishkan that we could apply today and contribute to our community today?
- How can we utilize the principles behind building the Mishkan to help perfect the home of God for us? (Tikun Olam, Community Development, a Just World)
- What does the fundraising campaign to build a Mishkan tabernacle teach us about community giving/engagement and responsibility?
